- State Law allows school districts the option of allowing a property tax exemption for military veterans.
 - The District is not reimbursed for this exemption by the state, but rather through a redistribution of taxes.
 - Total tax revenue stays the same
 - Those who qualify would see their taxes lowered
 - All others would see an increase



- Public survey offered
 September 24 October 26, 2018
- •413 Responses
- In favor of offering some level of Alternative Veterans' Tax Exemption Program
 - •65.4 % YES
 - •34.6% NO
